## PROPOSED FAMILY PLAN

Since the last issue of *Ranch Chatter*, there has been tremendous interest as well as some confusion, about the proposed MONTHLY FAMILY PLAN. The following are a few of the questions we've received and perhaps the answers will be of interest to your family.

## Who will be eligible for the Family Plan?

All Sustaining; Life, Permanent and Charter Members are eligible.

How much will this plan cost a family of five?

The proposed price will be \$3.00 a month, paid monthly, and will cover the entire family, regardless of size.

#### What do we get for only \$3.00 a month?

To begin with, each member of the family would be entitled to the first hour of Horseback and Bicycle Riding at no charge. Your family will enjoy unlimited use of our fine swimming facility at no charge and the golfers in the family will be able to take advantage of a special rate at the golf course.

I'm retired and my children are grown, do I have to take this plan?

Absolutely not! This program is strictly voluntary and will in no way affect your membership.

## How long do I have to sign up for?

In order to provide the plan at the lowest possible price, it will be necessary to take the plan for one year or a total of \$36.00. At the end of the year you may elect to continue or drop the plan based on your own satisfaction,

#### When does the plan go into effect?

As soon as we enlist the support of enough people to ensure the success of the plan.

## PROPOSED FAMILY PLAN BALLOT




## BUILDING NEWS by BERT KOCH

Harry and Alice Elam at the new home.



All in all, building is booming at Lake Elizabeth. If you would like information about building, contact Hank Boyle or myself at the club or the Glendale office.


## MR. JERRY BROWN APPOINTED GENERAL MANAGER


Our Pro, Allen Jones, and his lovely wife Carmen.
