HISTORY OF LAKE ELIZABETH

In our previous issue we devoted space to some of the historic structures on our own property and that of a couple of neighbors. Let's cross the road then from the original Lake Elizabeth school to account for the cement constructed tower, a duplicate of one seen alongside the road when driving thru the flourishing town of Newhall.

This tower was built in 1906 to house the electrical boosters, or transformers, installed by the now defunct Kern Water and Power Co., later taken into the Southern California Edison system. Edison has abandoned all easement rights for power lines at our request. There is, however, an amusing anecdote arising out of a tour we were giving friends during the first years of the Club.

The friends were Bill and Ta Brand of Holland Dutch extraction. After forty years in this country Bill still retained an accent almost thick enought to create fog. When we were passing the tower, Bill was moved to remark "Vot's dot ting?" Thinking to stir up a little humorous romance we casually explained it away as an old block house used to fight off invading Indian hostiles, even pointing to certain pock marks in the cement as having been made by bullets. Bill simply nodded his head and repeated "Yah yah," very understandingly.

On the following Wednesday while sitting quietly at my desk there was a sudden commotion. It was Bill stalking in to ask a question to resolve the problem that had been bugging him since the weekend. The question? "Ver dey get de cement?" Naturally cement was unknown to the Indians as it was to the earlier settlers. But we did enjoy a few laughs. Besides who ever heard of unfriendly Indians in the hills and valleys around Lake Elizabeth?

Leaving the tower we proceed another eighth of a mile to encounter one of the oldest adobe houses in our area, the "Tallamante's Adobe". Mr. & Mrs. Clarence Durrell, whose parents spent many years at Lake Elizabeth, and during our first years were employed by the Club, are the present owners of this sturdy old building. Owing to the thick wall construction, eighteen or more inches, the house remains pleasantly cool in the summer months and cozy warm during the severest winter weather. Also to be seen are a few typical outbuildings almost completely hidden by trees and shrubbery yet lending the entire complex a time-mellowed beauty and great charm.

Local residents were in almost unanimous agreement as to the age of the Tallamante's Adobe. In the year 1947 it was reputed to have been structured around 1802 which would give it in this year of our Lord, an approximate age of 166 years. Who knows but that Francisco Lopez might have helped with this historic building since he did build the adobe and small Catholic Chapel in the area immediately to the rear of our present Clubhouse complex, not a vestage of which remains today. The Mission Fathers

topped then to conduct religious ceremonies even as today mass is celebrated twice on Sunday morning at our own St. Elizabeth's Church.

Each of the sites and buildings we have dealt with in our running account really deserves much more elaboration than contained in this and previous installments. There are so many stories, yes, and so many legends affecting our area that only a complete volume would suffice to bring about a quickening of interest necessary to evoke broader questions and far more complete answers. Soon, we hope to point out more completely the history of a California civilization pre-dating our own American revolution.

THE HOT LINE (continued)






Have you dined out lately? Try our newly decorated dining room at the Clubhouse.




The renowned Canyon Country Color Cadets in their full-dress regalia.

A typical lodge interior.


GOLFER'S NEWS
