In this issue we return to the story, briefly interrupted by our "Memo of Appreciation," of the early years of our Club. Believing our lake to be so integral a part of the whole picture, it will be dealt with hereno pun intended - in depth.


The earliest name of record was, Laguna del Diablo, or by Spanish translation, Lake of the Devil. Doubtless this unhappy characterization of our presently useable, sparkling body of water was fashioned by the superstitious, often wine-imbibing Indian, Mexican and Spanish inhabitants of the lush valley area. Obviously many tall tales were told throughout the countryside; many the kind out of which legend is born.

Perhaps the most prevalent and presistent tale was one describing the lake as the home of a huge winged Dragon whose roar could be heard echoing up and down the valley. One can hardly doubt, then, the word of a vaquero working under Mayordomo of the ranch, Senor Vasquez, that he actually encountered the Dragon late one day while moving his herd of cattle close to the shore.

Well before the gathering dusk interfered with visibility he saw the monster arise from the lake to stride toward the fringe of the herd of fine plump cattle. Quickly he devoured one cow for a late afternoon snack. Now, if ever, was a time for bravery and action most heroic. So our valiant vaquero fired his gun into the armor-like hide of the Dragon only to note that his bullets glanced harmlessly aside. It was at this point our brave vaquero gave up the unequal struggle and fled the scene to describe to all who listened the monstrous appearance of the unholy Dragon making his home in the laguna!

To most of we moderns the Indian name for our history making lake is either lost in antiquity, or at least remains unknown except to the tribes who used the old, old trails. So we must be content with our Laguna del Diablo until shortly after the middle of the last century. In this period the lake was over two miles long with no dam dividing it in the center. Quite in reason, most travelers using El Camino Viejo de Los Angeles, presently called Lake Elizabeth Road, recognized this landmark as a veritable oasis of beautiful shoreline backed up by magnificent cottonwoods and willows.

Because this restful spot was at least a days journey by horse and buggy or stagecoach, we became a most desireable stopover on the trek north to such exotic places as Fort Tejon, Willow Springs, Havilah, Trona and Death Valley.

A family prominently identified with the development of California came to use our shore as a suitable encampment on their own northward trips. During a first stay one small daughter called Elizabeth was momentarily unattended by watchful parents whereupon she fell into the lake. Thenceforth, the family began to call our lake, Elizabeth's Lake. Soon the name was common usage throughout the southland. Finally, the map makers dropped the apostrophy and today we have Lake Elizabeth, after which our Ranch and Golf Clubs are named.

A picture of the north shore with its white sand and beach and spreading trees is printed and captioned in this issue. The snapshot was developed in the spring of 1947. Was this the lovely location where so many weary, dusty pioneers were able to pause in restful, beautiful surroundings before continuing their respective journeys?

Gene & Audry Martin's house-warming was well attended. A nice get-together with everyone enjoying the party and seeing their beautiful new home.


Jim & Charlotte Farinash will introduce their New Lodge to everyone this month.

Our Gen'l Mgr., Jerry Brown, assures us we will have the trap shoot ready for use by late spring. Dirt to move and bird house has to be built. We will stock shells and a few firearms, or you may bring your own muskets. Yes, there will be the usual charges made as at other such facilities.

A suitable boat ramp is now installed on the south shore close to the dam. To use your boat on the lake annual permission from the Board of Directors must be applied for and granted through the Glendale office. All fishermen must limit their catch to the following maximums; six catfish, three bass and fifteen bluegills. Violation of these rules may result in expulsion from the Club, or revocation of all lake privileges!

In a move to increase weekly activity in the horse department, the Board of Directors are pleased to announce that rates have been lowered from Monday through Friday to \$1.25 per hour. The \$1.75 per hour rate for horse rental will still be applicable on all holidays, and on any day preceding a national holiday.

Since we now have excellent fishing in the Lake, the former fishing lake is being renovated and deepened to ultimately be incorporated in our Western Village area. We trust that in the years to come this will become one of the popular beauty spots at the Ranch.

Our popular and accomplished square dance caller, Gayle Crouse, is scheduling square dancing on the first Saturday of each month. This schedule will be followed as long as attendance justifies its continuance. To those with little or no square dancing experience be assured that Gayle is a very accomplished and willing teacher.

Water skiing and sport cruising will henceforth be restricted to the hours between 10:00 a.m. and 4 p.m. daily. This will give fisherman the early and late hours, though there will be no restriction extended governing fishing except those set by the Dept. of Fish & Game. A license to fish issued locally or in your nearest sporting goods or hardware store is still a requirement.



'We are extremely proud of these young men and of the sons of our fine members who are engaged in protecting this great country of ours.


HORSE SENSE
